OLD AGE TAX BREAK

We heartily support Assemblyman John Mc-Carthy and State Senator Elisha Barrett for prefiling a tax relief bill that would allow a 50 percent reduction in assessments on owner-occupied homes for persons over 65 who have incomes of \$3,000 or less. Last year a similar bill sponsored by Barrett passed the Legislature but was vetoed by Governor Rockefeller. We hope it will become a reality during the coming Albany session. Mounting taxes have forced our older residents with low fixed incomes to have to give up their homes just when they need them most. It would be wonderful to offer our senior citizens some relief to spiraling taxes. They have endeavored all their lives to be self sustaining and to contribute to their community. We shouldn't let taxes rob them of their homes and of their self respect. Support Barrett and McCarthy in their fight for old age tax relief.

We also hope that the bill providing new County and Family Court Judges, sponsored by mrett and Duryea, will be passed. Last session it was allowed to die in committee due to the Democratic controlled legislature that acted on behalf of Lawrence Delaney. Our County has a terrific backlog of cases. We desparately need more judges to cope with our growing list of jud-

icial suits. Politics should never be allowed to thwart the process of our fine judicial system. And Why Not?

When laughter subsides I would like to recommend four books which might help throw some much needed enlightment on the subject.




In closing I would like to mention that myarticle was of constructive intent not intended to "Publicly disparage," and I hope the great majority of readers sensed this fact.




Letter to the Editor:
