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BE A GOOD SCOUT

The Suffolk County Boy Scouts will conduct a fund raising drive from February 8th through February 15th. They need to collect a minimum of \$200,000 for the coming fiscal year. To many of us this may seem a huge sum of money to spend on a good time for young boys. FAIR AND JUST

The Suffolk County Board of Supervisors has been ordered to readjust its voting power along the lines of population instead of the present one vote per town representation.

This decision is fair on one hand and grossly unfair on the other. It is only right that the large masses of people residing in western Suffolk be truely represented according to population. However, it is unjust that the lion's roar of the majority drown out the needs and wishes of the five eastern towns. The five eastern towns represent about half the land area of Suffolk County. Yet, this decision would give the western towns 90 percent of the voting power bloc.

There is talk of secession - of dividing Suffolk into two counties. We do not think this is the answer. Instead, we suggest a dual system of County government similar to the federal and state with one group of representatives based on population and another group of representatives based on area. Each group would have equal power. Thus, assuring a balance of power between eastern and western Suffolk. All interests would be served but the western towns would not dominate eastern Suffolk and eastern Suffolk would not inhibit the west. A fair and just system must be worked out to give both representation of people and physical area. And Why Not?
