manufacturing business. Long Island corporations, such as Reeves Instruments of Garden City, with its twelve-hundred jobs, are leaving the state. They plainly state that it is the exorbitant taxes and climate here in New York that is driving them out. Reeves is moving to Florida where the corporate tax is 2 percent of that of New York. Look at the new business growth in New Jersey, Delaware and Connecticut, to mention just a few, and you get an idea of where former New York State tax paying companies are relocating with all their good jobs.

TRANSPORTATION: Forgotten in this election campaign is the governor's insistence that eastern Long Island, and particularly Calverton, be the site of the next metropolitan jet port. The subject has been quieted to soothe the nerves of the eastern Long Island voter, but, rest assured, the matter will be resurrected vigorously again November. Couple this Rockefeller's socialization of the Long Island Railroad (a disaster of the first magnitude) and you can see how attuned he is to our transportation problems. Rockefeller's liberal philosophy says that if you spend enough money, any problem will go away. This is simply not true. Money is part of the answer, but competent people is the basic ingredient. Mr. Rockefeller's "competent" person is William Ronan. Mr. Ronan was touted as the Hercules who would rid us of our transportation problems. Mr. Ronan is an incompetent political appointee without experience in the transportation field. The results of his mismanagement are obvious. The Long Island Railroad is probably the worst in the nation. Its inability to be on time, its unsafe cars, its Toonerville Trolley atmosphere boggle the mind. All of the transportation facilities under Mr. Ronan's aegis suffer from the same lack of inspired and enlightened management. Couple this with the 2.5 billion transportation bond issue insisted upon by Rockefeller, which our children will still be saddled with, and you can only conclude that you are asking for more if our governor is reelected.

INFLATION: One of the basic causes of inflation is an over-abundance of money in proportion to the availability of goods. The supply of money is increased when wages are hiked. Apart from the broader national issues which contribute heavily to inflation, New York, under Rockefeller, has led the nation in the spiraling minimum wage. He has pushed the minimum wage above the national minimum regularly thus increasing the cost of goods. The result is that those who are retired or are on a fixed income find it increasingly difficult to get along on their income. It is a crime that those prudent people who have planned for their retirement years must bear the burden of Rockefeller's inflationary policies. Not only that, but he has expanded the size and scope of the state bureaucracy which has fed inflation substantially. earning power or those who must hold down two jobs to survive in mind when he contributed to inflation. He had his obligations to the labor unions and met their demands for a higher minimum wage in order to secure their political endorsment. We have all paid and will continue to do so if we have the misfortune to have to endure another Rockefeller term of office. Can we stand any more of Rockefeller's contributions to inflation? We think not.

ECOLOGY: Make your own comparisons and draw your own conclusions on the pollution problem as it exists today and how it was twelve years ago. Were our coastal waters and ocean cleaner then or now? Was the air cleaner then or now? Were fish more fit to eat then? Did you find human waste floating in the Sound like you do today? Where does Rockefeller's liberal school at Stony Brook dump its sewage? Where does the veterans hospital at Northport dump its waste? Who allows them to perpetuate pollution? Mr. Clean himself. As we see it, Mr. Rockefeller's main contribution to the ecology situation was to get passed the onebillion dollar clean water bond issue. This has put our children in hock, but we don't think it has really soved anything.

HOME RULE: Rockefeller has indicated his interest in protecting our right to home rule, our local master plans and zoning ordinances by passing on the state low-cost housing corporation. This permits anyone to build low-cost housing anywhere without regard to local zoning restrictions or master plans. This could completely upset the balance of community needs which planners must take into consideration. Schools, public services, business, the economy and taxes could be adversely affected by this. Rockefeller OK'd this over the strident objections of most local officials.

As in the New York gubernatorial race, the voters have a choice between two very similar candidates of the two major parties and the uniquely qualified candidate of the Conservative Party. These are only a few of the issues that Jim Buckley offers sound solutions to. National Environment Act, they do have jurisdiction. They have ordered Levon to refrain from further mining without their prior approval. We now have renewed hope that this rape of our area, which is almost certain to damage our water supply, can be halted. This is wonderful news. We congratulate the Army Corps of Engineers on this move.

The bad news is that our county and local town governments have just submitted their preliminary budgets. They are disastrous. Combined, they call for a real estate tax raise in some towns of over \$1 per hundred dollars of assessed valuation. Our elected officials are blaming the raise on increased welfare costs. Welfare is a big item but it certainly isn't the whole story.

The cost of government itself has skyrocketed. Our

legislators have given themselves, if the figures are approved, pay raises of as much as 35 percent. To justify their own raises, needless to say, they had to bow to the wishes of all other government employees and give them healthy raises also. This is all on top of last year's staggering increases.

We know of several instances of particular town officials who do not deserve the salary they are now getting. They are abusing the offices they hold. If they were working for anything but public office they would have been fired long ago. To ask us to grant them raises is ludicrous. We urge all residents of their towns to find out when the budget hearings are being held and to get to those meetings and sound off. Make your voice heard at the budget hearing. If you don't take an active part in your government all of the letters of complaint to editors of newspapers aren't worth a hoot. And why not?
